Rescheduled from 2019-2020 Upskill teaching staff in the delivery of National Curriculum Swimming to raise the quality of swimming teaching. Enable staff to develop knowledge, skills and confidence required to teach the swimming skills within the National Curriculum

Double up on all swimming sessions in the Summer term and extend them in length to make up for the Covid-19 pool closure in 2019-2020 and Autumn term 2020-2021.

Teachers to team-teach alongside the qualified swimming teacher.

Ensure there are two RESUS trained members of staff present on poolside at every swimming session.

Gain baseline data at the beginning of the Summer term and repeat assessment at the end of the Summer term.

Invitation only swimming club at lunchtime in the Summer term for the Y6 children not on track to achieve 25 metres by the end of the year.

Transport Year 6 children to a local swimming pool to experience safe water safety in a deeper pool.

£5350.00 coach- teacher upskilling

Doubling up on school swimming sessions and invitations to catch up sessions were not possible this year due to availability of staff and bubble restrictions.

Children were only able to access swimming in the Summer Term. Teachers did attend and team teach alongside Mrs Read. Teachers were responsible for assessing their class on poolside.

Swimming data was collected during the Summer Term. Children were not able to swim as usual during the Autumn Term due to the prolonged lockdown which resulted in gaps within data. As a result, a smaller percentage of children gained the expectation of swimming 25m by the end of Year 6.

As Covid-19 restrictions relax, look at the feasibility of transporting Year 6 children to a public swimming pool next year where the water is deeper to fulfil the entire water safety requirements within the National Curriculum

Bear in mind the lack of opportunities children had to swim this year and put plans in place to target a group of Year 5 children for a catch up lunchtime swimming club in the Autumn Term.

Registers have been kept to generate a record of numbers of children participating.

Children encouraged to write down names of sports they would like to try on the current Sports display board.

New netball posts have been purchased and used by classes already. Our caretaker is looking to create a more permanent fixture for these in the playground to prolong their use.

Upon request by a member of teaching staff, two 'Go Anywhere Barrows' were purchased towards the end of the academic year and have proved most helpful for staff in transporting equipment with ease out onto the field.

Conduct a survey in each class after the Summer holidays to find out which sports clubs are most desired in 2021-2022.
