COVID catch-up premium spending: summary

Total catch-up premium budget: £16240

Children and young people across the country have experienced unprecedented disruption to their education as a result of coronavirus (COVID-19). Those from the most vulnerable and disadvantaged backgrounds will be among those hardest hit. The aggregate impact of lost time in education will be substantial, and the scale of our response must match the scale of the challenge.

Schools' allocations will be calculated on a per pupil basis, providing each mainstream school with a total of £80 for each pupil in years reception through to 11.

As the catch-up premium has been designed to mitigate the effects of the unique disruption caused by coronavirus (COVID-19), the grant will only be available for the 2020 to 2021 academic year. It will not be added to schools' baselines in calculating future years' funding allocations.

Schools should use this funding for specific activities to support their pupils to catch up for lost teaching over the previous months, in line with the guidance on <u>curriculum expectations for the next academic</u> year.

Schools have the flexibility to spend their funding in the best way for their cohort and circumstances.

To support schools to make the best use of this funding, the Education Endowment Foundation (EEF) has published a <u>coronavirus (COVID-19) support</u> <u>guide for schools</u> with evidence-based approaches to catch up for all students. Schools should use this document to help them direct their additional funding in the most effective way.

Given the time children were out of school since March 2020, we are aware that they will have experienced differing amounts of teaching and learning. For the majority of children, they engaged well with the teaching and learning provided by the school whilst a small but significant number were unable to engage to a satisfactory degree.

Through the use of a mix of standardized tests and teacher assessment class teachers have identified those pupils who are at risk and need additional support to ensure they are at expected standards by the end of the academic year. The aim of the catch up premium strategy is to ensure that all children are reaching or exceeding age related expectations and close any gaps caused as a result of the national lockdown and the learning lost.

Priorities for 2020-21:

Reading and supporting low ability readers across KS1 and KS2. Ensuring appropriate books stock for low ability readers in KS2 which are high interest and meet their needs.

Spellings and application in KS2.

Health & wellbeing

Technology to support remote learning and delivery of lessons during isolation periods or bubble closures.
